"The IPCC-IPBES report clearly shows why carbon offsetting must be consigned to the dustbin of failed climate policies. The report unequivocally concludes that land- and ocean-based actions that capture carbon must be in addition to, and not in lieu of, ambitious reductions of emissions from fossil fuels. Ecosystems are at serious risk of degradation from climate change; the action required to stop climate change and biodiversity loss must be two-fold – reduce emissions and protect ecosystems. The age of offsetting, where companies continue emitting while claiming to be doing good by protecting biodiversity, is over."
